2021-2022 Legislative Session

CROSSOVER DATE NOTICE – bills that did NOT cross chambers before April 12, 2021 are marked with an asterisk*. These bills will not pass this session, though hearings may continue in some cases. These bills will become “active” again at the beginning of the 2022 session.

Senate Bills – click on the bill number for full text.

- *S 2 Behavioral and Public Health – Peeler, Malloy, McElveen, Hembree, Senn (Similar H 3766)**
This bill would rename the Department of Health and Environmental Control the "Department of Behavioral and Public Health", make it a Cabinet agency, and transfer environmental responsibilities to the SC Departments of Agriculture and Natural Resources. The bill would abolish the SCDMH and SC Mental Health Commission, as well as the Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services, and instead establish a Division of Mental Health and a Division of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services within the Department of Behavioral and Public Health.
Introduced, read first time, and referred to Medical Affairs Committee, 1/12/21.

*The Senate Medical Affairs Subcommittee has met three times on this bill. During the 4/28/21 hearing, Dr. Rogers provided testimony on behalf of DMH. At the third hearing on 5/5/21, the committee elected **not** to vote on the bill, citing the need for additional time before voting.*
- S 231 Student ID Card Suicide Prevention Act – Shealy, McLeod, Matthews (Similar H 3476)**
This bill would require public schools and public and private institutions of higher learning to add the telephone number for the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline to student ID cards, as well as appropriate telephone and text numbers for other hotlines.
Read third time and sent to the House 4/22/21; House introduced, read first time, and referred to Education and Public Works Committee 4/27/21.
- *S 259 Mental Health Transport – Kimpson**
This bill relates to the custody and transport of individuals believed to have mental illness and requiring immediate care; it would require that state or local law enforcement officers who transport these patients be part of a “therapeutic transport unit” and have undergone mental health and Crisis Intervention Training. The bill further requires that the physician responsible for the individual’s care notify a friend or relative of the patient that they may transport the patient to the indicated mental health facility, and that the friend/relative freely chooses to assume responsibility and liability for the transport. Finally, the bill would extend the time a patient may be held under the doctor’s certification when safe transport is not possible due to disasters or other conditions.
Introduced, read first time, and referred to Medical Affairs Committee, 1/12/21.
- *S 659 Sexually Violent Predator Program – Shealy (Similar H 4086)**
This bill would make several procedural and substantive changes to the "Sexually Violent Predator Act", including, among other things, defining who are qualified evaluators; changing timeframes for completing evaluations, and modifying procedural rules for requesting and participating in periodic evaluations and annual review hearings.
Introduced, read first time, and referred to Medical Affairs Committee, 3/11/21.

S 669 Mental Health Month – Alexander

This concurrent resolution would recognize the month of May 2021 as Mental Health Month in South Carolina to raise awareness and understanding about mental illness and the need for appropriate and accessible services for all individuals with mental illness.

Adopted and sent to House 4/08/21; House adopted and returned with concurrence 4/13/21.

Children's Advocacy Center Day – Shealy

S 671 This concurrent resolution would recognize Wednesday, April 7, 2021, as Children's Advocacy Center Day in South Carolina in honor of the important work done to combat the significant problem of child maltreatment.

Adopted and sent to House 3/24/21; House adopted and returned with concurrence 4/06/21.

***H 3230 Telepsychiatry Reimbursement – Herbkersman, Hosey, and Caskey**

This bill would require the SC Department of Health and Human Services to reimburse practitioners for mental health services provided via telehealth to patients enrolled in Medicaid.

Introduced, read first time, and referred to Ways and Means Committee, 1/12/21.

H 3773 Restoration Treatment – West, G.M. Smith, Weeks, White (Similar S 79)

This bill would extend the length of time certain individuals unfit to stand trial may be hospitalized from 60 to 180 days. It would also allow the SCDMH to provide restoration treatment in detention centers and on an outpatient basis, where appropriate.

Read third time and sent to the Senate 4/21/21; Senate introduced, read first time, and referred to Medical Affairs Committee 4/21/21.

***H 3888 Mental Health Study Committee – King, Bryant, Cobb-Hunter, Brawley**

This joint resolution would create a study committee to examine the state of mental health of South Carolina residents, to make certain findings, and prepare a report for the General Assembly before January 1, 2022.

Introduced, read first time, and referred to Medical, Military, Public and Municipal Affairs Committee 2/11/21.

SC Mental Health Commission Update

Elliott Levy, MD and Bobby H. Mann, Jr. were appointed to the SC Mental Health Commission April 7, 2021, representing the 1st and 4th Congressional Districts, respectively.

Dr. Levy has served as staff psychiatrist at the Ralph H. Johnson VA Medical Center since 2007 and as an affiliate associate professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the Medical University of South Carolina since 2012. He previously worked with the South Carolina Department of Mental Health in multiple capacities for more than 20 years. Dr. Levy, who is Board certified for the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, received his MD from and completed his residency in Psychiatry at the Medical University of South Carolina.

Mr. Mann, a partner at Temple & Mann Attorneys in Greenville, lives in Taylors, South Carolina. He is a graduate of Francis Marion College and the University of South Carolina School of Law. Mann is an attorney who has been practicing law in the Upstate for 36 years. His work in family law and probate matters have afforded him the opportunity to be involved with mental health issues in both legal and practical capacities.

Budget Update

SCDMH presented its FY 2022 Budget Request to the Governor's Office/Executive Budget Office 10/28/2020, to the House Ways & Means Healthcare Subcommittee 1/27/2021, and to the Senate Finance Healthcare Subcommittee March 3, 2021.

- SCDMH revised its budget request to include funds for additional state nursing homes January 27, 2021 and to adjust the recurring dollar amount for state veterans nursing homes April 15, 2021.

The table below shows the revised budget request side-by-side with recommendations from the Governor's Office, the House of Representatives, and the Senate.
